Watch the class web site for suggested subjects that might be suitable for a paper of at least seven pages and no more than ten (except by special arrangement) typed and double spaced. Your essay must be based on original source materials that are assigned for this course, available on reserve, or available on line through the Fordham [http://www.fordham.edu/halsall/sbook1c.html or Georgetown [http://labyrinth.Georgetown.edu/] web sites. Any other materials you wish to use should

be cleared with me. I define original source materials as writings or artistic productions of authors or artists that lived during the Byzantine period. You may use additional

secondary sources (modern commentaries about these authors), but your essay should be grounded in the writings of one or more Byzantine authors.

I will expect a title, outline and list of the source materials you plan to use by Friday, Feb. 8 in class. Papers are due Monday, March 3, in class. I will not accept papers after 4:00 p.m. on that day. Papers will be graded for content and style. I adhere strictly to the catalogue guidelines (see your schedule of classes) regarding incompletes. The essay should demonstrate your familiarity with the readings in the course. Please feel free to come to me for help with your papers. The juiciest materials for the paper (Anna Comnena and Michael Psellus) fall into the time frame of the later part of the course, so you might want to look these books over and read one or both of them at the beginning of the course. There is an extensive bibliography on the web site. It will direct you to topics of interest and additional primary source materials. If you are a freshman or a transfer student, or are not confident about writing a paper based on original sources, please come and see me immediately and I will help you get started.

STUDENTS MUST WRITE THE ESSAY AND TAKE THE FINAL EXAM IN ORDER TO RECEIVE A "PASS' OR A PASSING GRADE IN THE COURSE. This means that if you fail to turn in the paper, but take the final exam and receive an A, you will fail the course.
