Modern German Thought: Philosophical Irrationalism

HIEU 177/277 is a colloquium for upper-division students and graduate students. The class meets on Tuesdays at 1:00 pm in HSS 6008, and the principal responsibilities are the weekly readings and class participation. Each student will make at least one oral presentation on one of the weekly assignments. Readings are in English, but some background in European intellectual history or humanities is assumed.

A two-page paper is due one week after the oral presentation (based on a short passage from the reading); and an 8-10 page paper (10-12 pages for graduate students) is due on Monday, June 11. The long essay will be based primarily on the course reading, but ought to include additional work. Please see me by the seventh week to agree on a topic. Except where extensions have been arranged in advance, late papers will be penalized one-third of a grade per day.
