This course examines the interactions between the peoples and nations who bordered the Atlantic Ocean from the period 1492-1800. Students should come away from this course with an understanding of how these interactions created new societies, economies, and nation-states by the nineteenth century.

Assignments:

- 1) Weekly Journal of all assigned readings (20% of grade)- When writing your journal entries, you should think about important questions raised by the reading- especially questions that can be raised with the seminar. One important question concerns how these documents or essays speak to the creation of a new Atlantic or "American" culture, economy, or society. Another important question concerns the similarities and differences between the different nations and peoples in the "Atlantic World." It would also be a good idea to evaluate what the term "Atlantic World" means, in your opinion. These journals should be typed, and should be about 2-3 pages in length.
- 2) Research Paper based on biographies of figures in the Atlantic World (80% of grade)this paper should compare and contrast two biographies of figures such as the ones below,
 explaining how their lives illustrate the connections between societies and peoples in the Atlantic
 World. The two people you pick should be from different ethnic backgrounds (for example one
 British Protestant, one African slave, or a French colonists with a Native American, etc.)
 Examples of possible biographies follow below, but this is by no means an exhaustive list:

Christopher Columbus- Hernan Cortes- Pocahontas- Walter Raleigh- John Smith- Richard Hakluyt- Henry Morgan- Gottlieb Mittelberger- Joseph Brant- Conte Louise de Frontenac- John Newton- Olaudah Equiano- Benjamin Franklin- George Washington- Toussaint Louverture
