# The Middle East in the Age of European Empires 1798-1920

### **Course Description**

This course is an introduction to the principal historical themes shaping the modern Middle East. The class is suitable for students with no prior knowledge of the region and its history, though students who wish to further their studies in Middle Eastern history can profit from the course too.

In geographical scope we will discuss the Ottoman Empire, its Arab provinces, Egypt and Iran. The course comprises a brief background to the history of the region and follows with the long nineteenth century through the First World War and the dissolution of the Ottoman Empire.

The course treats several themes, including society and economy, central government reform, the emergence of new forms of identity and other challenges to the Ottoman order, and the entry of both informal and direct European colonial rule into the region. While we will follow the political narrative of this history, we will be also concerned to study and discuss what history and politics have meant for ordinary men and women, and the roles they have played in making their own histories.
